Sentence Types/ Sentence Variation:

Sentence variation involves alterning sentence structure and length to create a rhythm in writing.

There are four types of sentences:

- Simple Sentences.
- Compound Sentences.
- Complex Sentences.
- Compound- Complex Sentences.

Simple Sentences:

- A simple sentence has only the most elemental building blocks of a sentence; a subject and a verb in a complete thought. A simple sentence is also called an independent clause.
- Eg:
- Jennah everyday goes to library to study.
- types of simple sentences:
- Compound Verbs and Compound Subjects.
- Single Subject and a Single Verb.

- Compound verbs and compound subjects:
- Some sentences have a single subject and two or more verbs and vice versa.
- Eg:
- <u>Jack and Jill</u> went up a hill.
- Alex <u>walked and looked</u> around.

- Single subject and a single verb:
- This type of sentence has only one subject and one verb.
- Eg:
- He sold it for a high price on Amazon.
- I quickly put on my red winter jaket, waterproof boots, homemade mittens, and handknit scarf.

Compound Sentences:

- A compound sentence has two independent clauses, or two simple sentences. The independent clauses are usually joined with a coordinating conjunction and a comma.
- The coordinating conjunctions:

FANBOYS

For, And, Nor, But, Or, Yet, So

Eg:

My uncle and his son love to watch American Idol, but I have never seen the point of the show

Complex Sentences:

A complex sentence contains one independent clause and one or more dependent clauses. The dependent clause begins with **a subordinating conjunction**.

Subordinating Conjunctions:

After, although, though, as, because, before, if, even though, in order that, once, provided that, since, so that, than, that, unless, untill, when, while... etc.

Eg:

Because her teeth were chattering in fear, lynda clenched her jaw muscle while waiting for her turn to audition.

Compound- Complex sentences:

• A compound- complex sentence contains more than one independent clause and at least one dependent clause.

• Eg:

- Because Bill forgot to pay his electric bill, his electricity was cut off, and all the ice cream in his freezer melted.
- The man believed in the system, and he knew that justice would prevail after the murderer was sent to jail.
